Lest We Forget

Teaching Mutual Respect is embedded in to every conversation and every action at our school and this was the message that we gave to our students about ANZAC Day. We asked them to turn up to march to represent our school to demonstrate their respect of the suffering and sacrifice of all of those who went to war and fought for our sakes – and turn up they did! I was so very proud of how many came, it showed such school pride and team spirit.

I am constantly proud of our students and how they conduct themselves. They did our school, their families and themselves proud on Saturday morning. They looked wonderful and they behaved as we would expect that they behave – respectfully and with pride.

I would like to thank the parents and students of the Horse sports Team as I know that loading and grooming horses ready for the parade would have been no mean feat and the Cattle Team who had made an effort to look so smart. I would also like to extend my thanks to Tom Quigley for coming to school on Friday and marching up and down the back oval with 120 primary students marching up and down behind him with several interesting domino effects to add to the challenge! After this practice, Mr Lee's enthusiastic drummers did an amazing job leading the parade with Braedan Ball pounding an impressive beat for all to march to. I do know that some of the drummers have got a taste for it now and this may be a regular occurrence!

P.A.R.T.Y

Next week a group of Year 10, 11 and 12 students will travel to a workshop to be held at Dubbo Base Hospital. P.A.R.T.Y stands for Prevention of Alcohol and Risk-related Trauma in Youth and is run by a team that has travelled to Dubbo from the Royal North Shore Hospital in Sydney.

The students will:

- ♦ Hear from doctors and nurses, allied health staff and paramedics on the harsh reality of poor choices;
- ♦ Spend time in interactive sessions in the emergency room, intensive care and rehabilitation units to understand how it feels to have a severe injury or disability;
- ♦ Hear the story of a trauma patient recovering from their injuries on the trauma ward;
- ♦ Meet with an injury survivor who shares their story on how life has changed.

We feel so strongly that our students should hear the message from this program and so we are subsidising the travel to make the day free of charge. One wrong choice can wreck your life and we are committed to ensuring that all of our students act wisely and stay safe.

Excellence Framework data Reports

This week I downloaded reports relating to how our school fairs in relation to the new Schools Excellence Framework and it was very pleasing to see concrete evidence of how our school continues to improve. The 'Value Added' was excellent across both primary and secondary and our attendance was excellent. Our annual growth rate since 2010 has been 11.5%, in comparison to 'similar schools' which had a growth rate of -2%!

I will be discussing the Excellence Framework and the data reports at our next P&C meeting on Tuesday 12th May, along with our 2015 School Plan. The Annual School Report is also available on our website and I will bring copies to the P&C meeting should anyone like a copy. The program was structured so that we were broken up into small groups with students from other schools. We then participated in two lectures from a selection of four. These were media, arts, nursing and PDHPE.

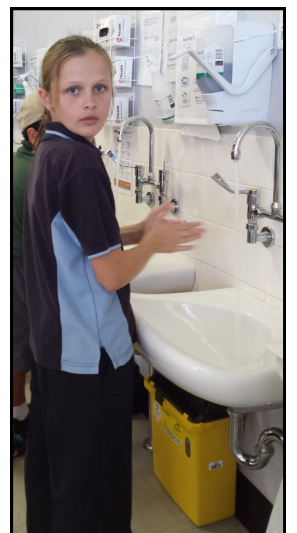

WHAT IS THE FAMILY ENERGY REBATE?

The Family Energy Rebate helps to cover the cost of energy bills for NSW households with dependent children. In 2014-2015 the rebate gives:

- Up to \$150 credit on electricity bills for eligible applicants who hold an account with an electricity retailer
- Up to \$165 direct payment to nominated bank accounts for eligible applicants who live in a residential community (caravan or mobile home park) and receive electricity from the park operator.

AM I ELIGIBLE FOR THE REBATE?

To be eligible you MUST:

- Be a NSW resident; and
- Have been assessed by the Federal Department of Human Services (DHS) as being eligible for the Family Tax Benefit (FTB) A or B at any time during the 2013-2014 financial year, and have received an FTB payment in respect of that eligibility; and
- Be an account holder of an electricity retailer, or a long-term resident of a residential community (caravan or mobile home park), whose name appears on the electricity account for supply to her or his principal place of residence.

WHAT DO I NEED TO DO BEFORE I APPLY?

Before you apply, here's a quick checklist. Have you:

- Lodged your tax return for 2013-2014 with the Australian Taxation Office or informed the Department of Human Services (DHS) if you are not required to lodge a tax return?
- Received confirmation from DHS as to your eligibility for Family Tax Benefit A or B for 2013-2014?

HOW TO APPLY

- **ONLINE** – it takes just two minutes to submit an application. Processing starts immediately.
- **PAPER** – download a form from the website, complete and submit by email, fax or post. Use this form if you receive your electricity from the operator of the residential community where you live.

Schools Day with Dr Rabie (Private Hospital)

The current arrangement that we have with Dubbos' PUBLIC Ear Specialist, Dr Quddusi is called a 'Schools Day'. It is organised through Rachel Mills Hearing Support Otitis Media, Donna Rees (Assistant Principal Hearing Support) at the Hearing Support Team in Dubbo and Kerry Inder at the Hear our Heart Ear Bus Project. Once a Month Dr Quddusi gives us a full Clinic Day and he will see children and their Parents, accompanied by us. Parents are **expected to attend**. We also like to take the Aboriginal Education Officer or the Learning and Support Teacher from the child's school with us as this helps break the barriers between home and school. We make the appointments for the day and book kids in from the same school at the same time so they have familiar faces around them. Parent education can also be delivered at this time by us.

Patients are billed for the appointment under Medicare

- The child needs a GP referral and Medicare card for the appointment. A current hearing test would be helpful.
- Appointments can **ONLY** be made by phoning us: Donna 0419534447, Rachel 0413687671 or Kerry 0459 479 369. DO NOT by phone Dr Rabies Office.
- We organise the appointment times and then give Dr Rabies' Secretary Colleen, the list 2 days before Schools Day.
- We will follow up with the Parents and the School with the outcomes from the appointment. We also do home education with the families as we have found that by educating the Parents the child's hearing problems improve at a much faster rate.

After the Schools Day

If surgery is required we liaise and support the Parents especially if there is funding for the operation needed. Dr Rabie will not charge a fee above Medicare. However Parents need to pay for the Private Hospital bed. If a child is under DoCs or other support agencies often we can arrange for the agency to pay for the hospital bed. Some Parents have borrowed money from their employer and had the money repaid from their weekly wages.

Approximate Private Hospital costs are:
2 grommets and adenoids \$1500 for the hospital bed for Day Surgery.
2 grommets, adenoids and tonsils \$1700 for the overnight bed.
Anaesthetist gap fee of \$150 paid before surgery.

Another option is to see Dubbos' other Private ENT, Dr Ridha

Cost for consult is \$130-\$400
His wait for a consult is up to 2 months.
He now provides hearing testing for a fee which can be claimed back from Medicare.
His wait for surgery at the Dubbo Base Hospital under Medicare is up to 10 months.
Dr Ridha does operate at the Private Hospital and normal fees apply.

- However we do have an arrangement with him to bring needy children and he will see them under Medicare. This needs to be arranged by us.



DUBBO SUPPORTED EAR SPECIALIST CLINIC DAYS

A joint initiative bought to you by Dept of Education Hearing Support,
NSW Health and the Hear our Heart Ear Bus Project.

'Schools Day' with Dr Quddusi (Specialist Medical Centre)

The current arrangement that we have with Dubbos' PUBLIC Ear Specialist, Dr Quddusi is called a 'Schools Day'. It is organised through Rachel Mills Hearing Support Otitis Media, Donna Rees (Assistant Principal Hearing Support) at the Hearing Support Team in Dubbo and Kerry Inder at the Hear our Heart Ear Bus Project. Once a Month Dr Quddusi gives us a full Clinic Day and he will see children and their Parents, accompanied by us. Parents are **expected to attend**. We also like to take the Aboriginal Education Officer or the Learning and Support Teacher from the child's school with us as this helps break the barriers between home and school. We make the appointments for the day and book kids in from the same school at the same time so they have familiar faces around them. Parent education can also be delivered at this time by us.

Patients are billed for the appointment under Medicare

- The child needs a GP referral and Medicare card for the appointment.
- The child also needs a current (within 3 months) hearing test for the appointment. Dr Quddusi is very adamant about this.
- 2015 Dr Quddusi is only wanting to see children with a moderate loss (40dB) if no improvement after the Child's 2nd test. He would prefer us to monitor mild loss children and bring them to him after 6 months of no change in their tests.

- We organise the appointment times and then give Dr Quddusi Secretary Karen, the list 2 days before Schools Day.
- We will follow up with the Parents and the School with the outcomes from the appointment. We also do home education with the families as we have found that by educating the Parents the child's hearing problems improve at a much faster rate.

After the Schools Day

If surgery is required Dr Quddusi Secretary Karen will liaise with the Parents to organise this.
➤ there is up to a 10 month wait for grommets. If the Parents elect to have grommet surgery in Mudgee there is only a 5-6 month wait.
