The term has got off to a great start!

A New Era

2016 marks the beginning of a new phase in the life of Trangie Central School. This year is the first year that the secondary numbers have overtaken the primary numbers, even though these also remain strong. The senior numbers in particular are growing and we have the largest Year 11 that I have ever known since I have been here. Senior students attract significant staffing and this increase in numbers will reflect strongly in our staffing entitlement, which I will receive next week.

We have a wide range of subjects offered and these include Senior Science, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, three levels of Mathematics and four levels of English. We have experienced and dedicated staff, a broad and extensive curriculum offering and a very diverse and exciting extra-curricular program.

The appointment of our Deputy Principal, Ms Trudgett is already having an impact on our operation and is enabling a streamlining of our executive structure. Our Assistant Principals are doing a fantastic job in the Primary School, with Ms Elgood bringing a host of new skills to our school, particularly in the area of Technology. On Monday we will be interviewing for a new Head Teacher, Teaching and Learning and this will complete the revolution that has taken place. Our whole staff is excited and energised by the new and extra staff that we have appointed this year and we go from great to greater.

Paying high fees does not give a corresponding increase in quality and I would like to thank all those parents and carers who support and trust us with their children, particularly in the secondary school. A strong school is vital for the health of our community and we are committed to ensuring that our school is a true community resource.

Communication

Our school prides itself on being open to suggestions from all members of our community. Our staff are consulted before decisions are made and they have input into the programs we run and the directions that we take. We are a united and cohesive team and this is also true of our parents and carers. We truly want to be the very best school that we can be and we are always pleased to hear your comments and suggestions. The avenue for communicating these ideas is through the Community Liaison Officer, directly to me or by joining the P&C. We also make phone calls to our families and survey opinions on a regular basis so there is plenty of opportunity to have your say. This term I intend to consult people and investigate other ways that your opinions can be sought.

There is very little influence to be had if the proper channels are not used, however and so much to be gained by getting involved, joining in and helping our school to be great.

Head Teachers' Report

It has been a fantastic start to the school year for both students and staff. All classes are establishing routines and working productively. There is a positive vibe throughout the school and new friendships are developing among our students.

Cyber Safety

The expected visit by our Police Community Liaison Officer has been postponed to a date in the future as he was unable to attend last Friday due to other urgent commitments. Further details regarding this important program will be provided when a new date is confirmed.



Vocational Education and Training (VET)

Our school delivers a broad curriculum suited to our secondary students. We work in collaboration with other educational institutions to enable our students to obtain their HSC. Our senior students undertake courses delivered by the Western Access Program (WAP), internally at our school and via the Western Institute of TAFE. This year we have a student enrolled in the IPROWD program. This is a specialist training program to assist Aboriginal people to gain entry to the NSW Police Academy at Goulburn, which is the first step to becoming an officer in the NSW Police Force. Another senior student is completing their Certificate II in Community Services – Aged Care. Several other students have enrolled in Outdoor Recreation courses that will require them to participate in 'block release' programs that involve camping in remote environments for a week. Primary Industries students will gain competencies in agricultural modules to enable them to attain a Certificate II in Agriculture. Our Hospitality students will again learn valuable workplace skills as they work towards obtaining their Certificate II in Hospitality.

Year 11/12 Western Access Program Study Camp

A reminder to all of our senior students in 11 and 12 that our Western Access Study Camp at Lake Burrendong will be held next week on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. All senior students are required to attend. Several of our secondary staff teach subjects over the Western Access Program and they will also be in attendance over these days as they will be teaching 'face to face' with their students. This study camp is a valuable opportunity for students to get to know their teachers and classmates from the other WAP schools.

Clue 1: This animal is a nocturnal desert-living marsupial.

Clue 2: There were 2 species of this animal. One is endangered, the other is extinct. Feral animals such as foxes, cats and dogs prey on them. Introduced animals such as rabbits, goats and other grazing animal compete with them for food and also destroy their shelter.

Clue 3: This animal has one of the shortest gestation (pregnancy) periods of about 12-14 days.

Clue 4: This animal does not need to drink often. It gets most of its water from the food it eats such as insects, fruit, seeds, fungi, worms, termites, small lizards and spiders. One of its favourite plant foods is the bush onion or yalka which grows in desert sand plains after fires.

Clue 5: this animal's scientific name is *Macrotis lagotis*.

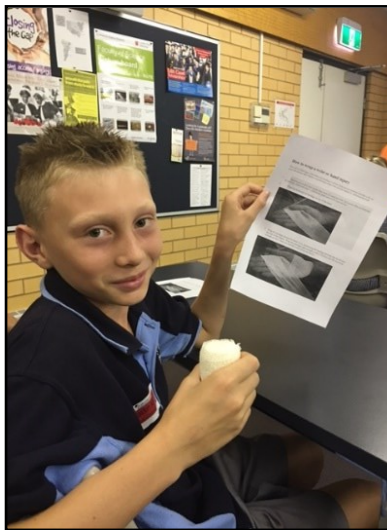

Helping your child with reading

Be confident that your child will learn to read. Show that you enjoy reading by having lots of different reading material at home and by giving books as special presents.

Children value reading through watching members of their family read and write every day. Encourage your child to read anytime, anywhere.

Children often enjoy reading more if it is shared. Make time away from television and interruptions to read aloud with your child.

Read in your home language if your first language is not English.

Encourage your child to read by sharing such activities as:

- reading signs and posters
- following a street directory
- checking the television guide
- choosing a video
- using a recipe
- reading game rules
- reading the newspaper aloud together
- playing word games including crossword puzzles
- reading instructions
- looking at letterbox leaflets
- finding brands at the shops
- reading magazines, comics, poems and rhymes.



Listen to your child read every day. Here are some ideas to use now and then, but remember some reading should just be for pleasure:

- look at the cover, title, pictures and talk about what the book might be about
- talk about the story so far and what might happen next
- after reading, talk about the story and ask questions
- talk about the pictures and how they add meaning to the text
- take turns when reading a harder book.

Remember the three Ps for new words: pause, prompt, praise.

That is, allow your child time to work out the word (pause), use clues taken from the context (prompt) and praise your child for trying.

If necessary, however, simply tell your child the word.

Talk to your child's classroom teacher or the principal for further help and advice.
