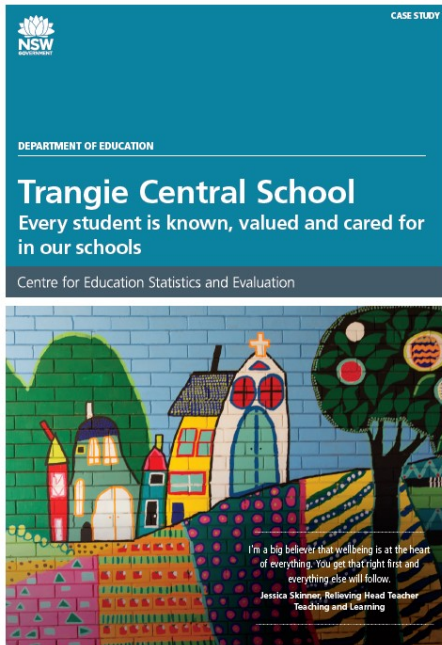

Hi everyone – At TCS we believe that if we get the wellbeing right, academic success will follow!

This week a case study was released to outline how our school created such a fantastic environment that our Tell Them from me Surveys, completed by our students twice each year, reported such a strong feeling of wellbeing, belonging and strong relationships with their teachers.

Our school was identified in the top five schools in the state based on levels of student advocacy and wellbeing. I have taken some graphs at random from the primary and secondary survey reports to illustrate how very well we have been rated in a wide range of areas.

We have worked very hard to ensure the wellbeing of all of our students, areas identified as 'Social-emotional outcomes' and this is reflected in the results, but it is now very pleasing to see that the levels of satisfaction in areas identified as 'Drivers of Student outcomes' is on the rise.

We are now seeing higher than state average results for 'rigour', 'intellectual engagement' and 'effective learning time'. We had always said that if we got wellbeing right, then everything else would follow and it is very gratifying to see that this is definitely happening.

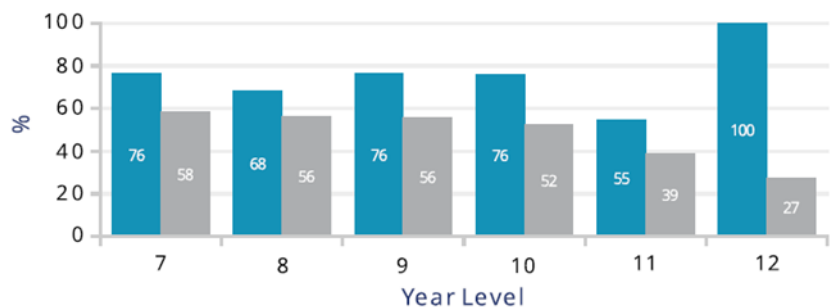
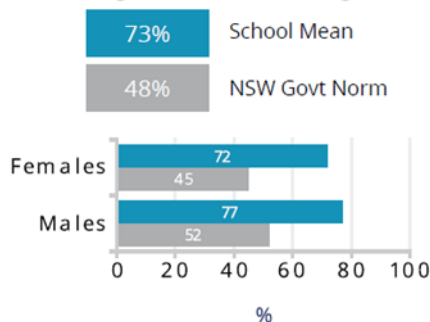
We have a talented and dedicated staff who truly care for their students and their only desire is to make a difference.

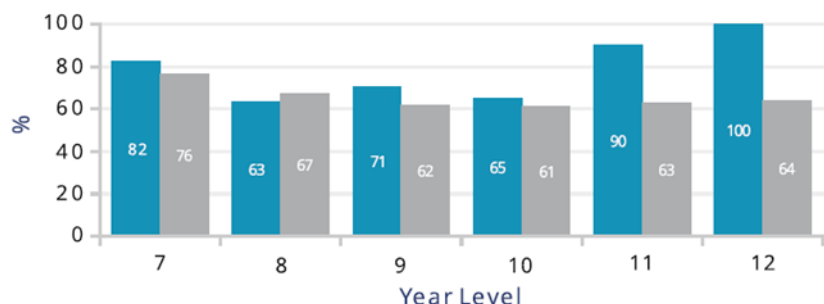
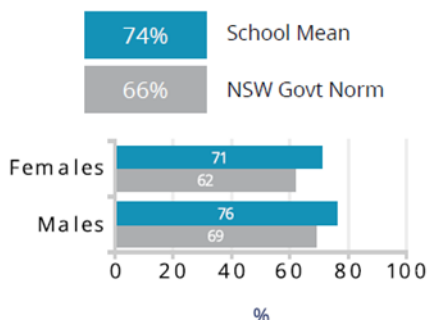
Student participation in school sports

Students feel accepted and valued by their peers and by others at their school.

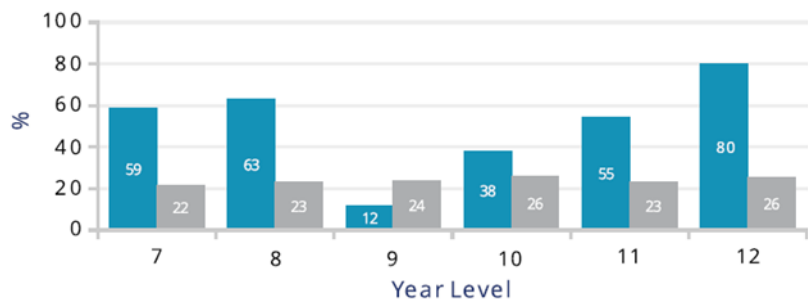
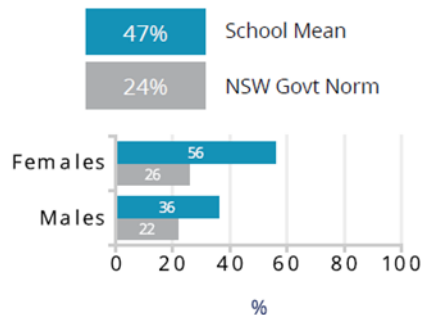

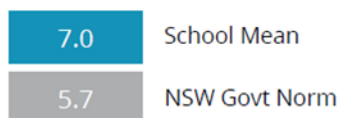
Student participation in extracurricular activities

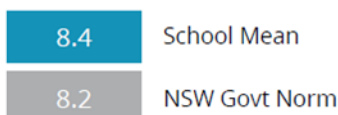

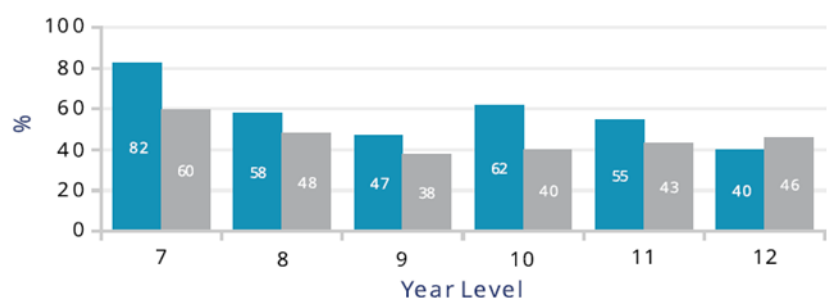
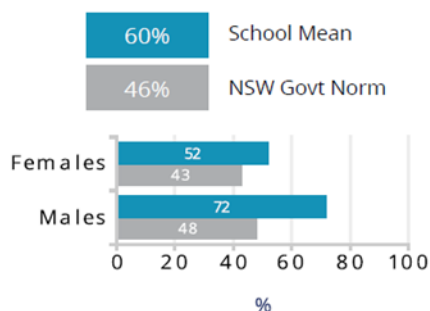

Northern Schools Steer Competition

Last week the Bovine Team, made up of Will Anderson, Paige Brown, Skye Winter, David Barclay, Lilly Dayes, Jessie McKeown, Montana White, Ben Cannon, Ben Cook and Sebastian Galea, travelled to Inverell to compete in the Northern Schools Steer Competition. This competition is hosted by New England schools to promote the cattle industry in a hoof and hook competition. 18 schools were represented from west to the Queensland border, with over 350 students competing. We took 5 steers, kindly transported by Rod Anderson and Mark Haines, with Steve Chase generously loaning his large trailer to help with this activity. Kylie Moore also kindly came to help and support the trip. The steers which we took away were made up of 3 Shorthorns, bred and supplied by Hugh and Amanda Kater, as well as an Angus cross and a Speckled Park.

After a long and adventurous trip to Inverell, the students worked hard to prepare the steers for competition, as well as practising their skills in leading, herdsman-ship and junior judging. There were workshops for the students to help share knowledge and tips for both parading and judging prior to the events. Students worked well as a team, encouraging and helping to correct each other's techniques in the ring. With over 200 Stage 4 students competing, it was very exciting that Will and Sebastian made it to the Year 7 & 8 finals. All students did very well, as for most it was their first show. The Wednesday evening culminated in students from different schools working together in a treasure hunt as a get-to-know you activity. The students made a few new friends, mostly from Nyngan High.

On the Thursday, students were up bright and early to wash and get the steers ready for judging. We received a highly recommended ribbon for one of the shorthorns. The steers were then loaded for transport to Bindaree Beef at Inverell.

On the way home, we stopped at the Myall Creek Memorial site between Bingara and Delungra to learn about a darker chapter in Australian history, which students will study later in History. The steer carcasses were judged on Monday and we now await the results to come through for feedback for next year's competition. I would really like to thank Rod Anderson, Kylie Moore and Mark Haines for their dedication and support, as the event would not have been as successful without their help and assistance.

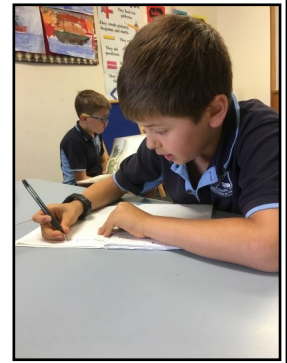
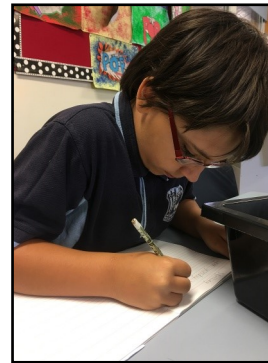
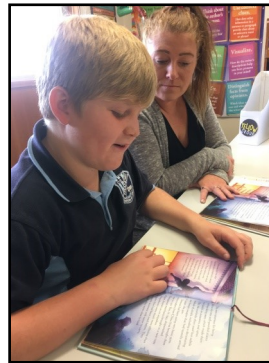
Quality Teaching

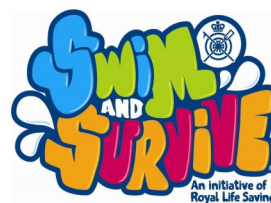
