Head Teachers' Report

There are a lot of things coming up over the next couple of weeks as we move into the school holidays. Next week we have Presentation Day on the Wednesday, starting at 11.30am, with a BBQ lunch. We are also excited about having the Middle School STEM "Country Table" market, where students will be displaying and selling some of the products which they have either produced during STEM this term, or sourced as an alternative product to plastic use, in order to reduce the amount of plastic in our environment.

Also next Tuesday, we have Years 10 and 11 girls completing a work readiness workshop presented by the Beacon Foundation on "My Road", aimed at skills and aspirations in the workforce. On Thursday, we had the White Training booked in for students in Year 10 and 11, however we haven't had a great deal of interest at the moment. I would encourage all students to take this opportunity to complete this qualification, as it is being offered at a subsidised rate which they won't get outside of school.

On Friday, our regular morning tea will include the students who have just completed their Year 12 and their families, as an informal farewell to the end of the year. This will commence at 11am.

Just a reminder that all students are expected to come to school over the next couple of weeks to work. We don't have downtime until the last day, so please make sure that students have books and equipment to work with. Some students have been reminded that they need to be respectful and behave appropriately as we come to the end. Hang in there, holidays will soon be here!

In the following week, Wednesday the 19th December (last day of school), Secondary students will have their RAMS Reward Day. It is important to remember that students who have had attendance or behavioural issues over the term may not be eligible to attend. This includes suspensions and monitoring cards, stay tuned for more details.

This week, Mrs Rush organised Mock Interviews and career workshops for all Year 10 and 11 students at the Trangie USMC. This involved preparing students for an interview based on a job advertisement of their choice. Students learnt and practised their communication skills, ironing clothes, personal presentation and strategies within the interview to portray a great impression. On Tuesday, students were scheduled for their interviews. Looking fantastic and very nervous they walked down to the Club to participate in their Mock Interview. Students received constructive feedback from their interviewers, prepping them on things to work on for next time. Feedback from students and those participating was excellent, and they all got something out of the experience. I would like to thank Mrs Rush for her fantastic organisation, community representatives who gave up their time to support our students in their workplace readiness and interviews, as well as the RSL Club for the use of their venue.

Year 9/10 Food Technology

On Monday 3rd December, some of our Food Technology students had the opportunity to visit our local butcher Adam Bond. Initially shy, our students warmed to the small business as Adam explained the process in which he sources his meat from paddock to plate. We were excited to learn that most of his meat is sourced from local farmers in the Nyngan/Trangie/Dubbo area, employing local people. He, alongside other butchers in the region, showed a passion for locally, ethically produced meat without the introduction of artificially made components. Did you know that Adam's sausages are low fat, high quality beef with all natural casing??? Adam also explained to us the different cuts and the ability to use them to cook different meals to suit a variety of budgets. We were able to watch the sausage making/mincing process which is our food of the week. We will now try out some classic recipes highlighting mince, which they should be able to cook at home! This trip has reinforced our theory work which is focussing on food and its influence both socially and economically.

Victor Chang Cardiac Institute Research Awards

Congratulations to both Shakirra Bock-Kemp and James Churchward for receiving the prestigious Victor Chang Science Award on Thursday 29th November. Typically only one student from each school can win this award, but in an unprecedented decision BOTH of our nominees were awarded because the selection panel could not decide over who was most worthy, each demonstrating excellence in different fields! This is an outstanding result and demonstrates the high level of achievement that is recognised at our school. The ceremony is a formal affair, and the guest speaker was Dr Alastair Stewart from the Victor Chang Institute. He gave an inspiring speech outlining the extraordinary opportunities that a career in Science can afford those who choose it as a career path. In the last 18 months, Dr Stewart has travelled to New Zealand, England, USA and all around Asia and Europe for work, and he gets to play with equipment worth millions of dollars. James particularly liked the idea of shooting electrons at bacteria, just for fun! Kirra thought researching zebra fish to look at how they regenerate their own heart tissue was more fascinating! The Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute established the awards more than a decade ago, to foster and encourage an interest in Science. Victor Chang was a visionary who pioneered the way for heart research and he performed the world's first successful heart transplant. He believed that Science was the way to improving every person's life and he was passionate about making a difference. Kirra and James now have the opportunity to travel to the Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute in Sydney and meet the researchers who are working to improve our knowledge of heart disease with a view to treating or curing it.



GoMAD Celebration Camp

A group of six students with Ms Bretag, travelled to Gulgong to attend the celebrations for the Bird Sanctuary project we have been working on over several months. Students from Primary and Secondary have created a zone filled with native shrubs, bushes and grasses to attract the small birds that have been displaced by habitat loss. As the garden grows it will provide food, shelter and protection for them. Students participated in environmental workshops, nature walks with rangers and meet students from other schools to showcase all the projects that GoMAD has supported.

The girls got to meet some students from Coonabarabran High School, another participating school of GoMAD, share their videos of each project and discuss how they are going and share ideas for growth. We also looked at taking inspiration from the past into the future and curbing our consumption of wasteful products and even made our own butter to have with scones for afternoon tea. We were also treated to a yummy dinner out at one of the lovely bistros in town and checked out the Red Hill Gold Mine on the way home.

On the second day, we went for a walk up Flirtation Hill to connect with our environment and search for inspiration through nature. Following this we heard from Gail, a Wiradjuri woman who is involved in artefact extraction and restoration of mine sites in the area. Our activities concluded with a 'Toastmasters' practice where students received various statements to argue in a brief speech, which all of our girls smashed! Our two elder girls, Jessica and Stacey were great mentors for the younger girls and all of them really engaged with all activities.







Start reading with myON!

Be sure you are connected to Wi-Fi.

1. Go to www.myON.com/school/ASR

2. Enter the following information.

3. Select a book and start reading!

Did you know?

- ✓ You can browse or search the myON digital library to find books that are just right for you.

Here's how:

1. Launch your myON app.

Then, set up your device.

1. Open the new myON app on your device.
2. Choose to "Add User" or "Link User."
3. Follow the onscreen instructions, and enter your login information.
4. Sign in! Select "User" and enter your username again when prompted.
5. Now that you're signed in, start adding books to read anytime.

Choose the "Add Book" or "+" icon, and search to find books to add. When you've found a book to add, just click "download." Repeat for up to 20 books.
