# FROM THE PRINCIPAL

*Hi everyone – TCS - a strong values-driven education with high academic expectations!*

## Values

At Trangie Central School we pride ourselves on having a strong emphasis on teaching Values to our students. We teach and model acceptance, tolerance and kindness and the success of this focus is evident every day in our playground and classrooms. We have a staff and student body who work harmoniously with each other and the number of extra-curricular activities that our staff offer in their own time and of their own accord is indicative of a positive and vibrant school culture.

Relationships are the key to success and a strong sense of belonging. Relationships are strengthened when students and staff share a wide range of experiences with each other, in and out of the classroom. The debating, dancing, sport, interest groups, music, singing, cattle team etc all contribute to a climate of opportunity and aspiration, where everyone has the chance to shine. Wellbeing is the key and the foundation of success. We are very proud of where we are and where we are going!

## Focus on Technology

This term we continue our focus on Technology. We began the term with an excellent Staff Development day where we saw two visiting specialists join us for the day. Mr Sam Di Sano, from Atomi PD, brought with him expertise on developing skills in school leaders and in how to utilise technology and a new approach to the classroom. We also welcomed Mr Shane Byrne from ACARA who is our coach for our Middle School Digital Technology in Focus project.

The day was intended to provoke thought about how the needs of our students are changing as technology changes, and also how technology is changing the way students learn and think. We also wanted to extend the knowledge and understanding of our staff in what is available, in coding and educational Apps and how our classroom practice needs to adapt to reflect our changing world.

We began as a staff to consider student wellbeing, engagement, achievement and the need for change in classroom practice. It was very reassuring to see how many ‘boxes we tick’. Over the years we have seen our school transformed into a place of academic aspiration and creativity and this has been achieved by focusing first and foremost on student wellbeing. We have seen how the practice has been successful but it was great to hear that the theory supported our, at the time, intuitive approach.

Mr Di Sano delivered a session to our executive team on Change Management in Teaching and Learning and we gained some ideas about how to manage an ever-changing environment. I had heard a lot about ‘Blended and Flipped Learning’ but after Monday I now have a much better idea of what that is and how I could apply it to make my own classroom more vibrant and collaborative. There is definitely a move towards more collaboration between students and between students and teachers and we gained a lot of examples of how this could be applied.

Mr Byrne gave us some excellent ideas about different types of coding. We are already quite a long way down the path of being a 'coding school' with robotics in secondary Interest Groups, and Scratch in morning DEAR groups and in primary classes. Scratch is a block programming language and the sky is really the limit with what it will do. Mr Holden and Year 8 are really getting carried away with shapes, colours and then adding music to it. Our robots sort colours, follow pathways and lift loads and Year 6 have created games using Scratch. Regardless of what language we use, it is the development of the thinking process involved that is the fundamental skill, vital in the world of work that our students will enter in the future. We will definitely be ready for any challenge!

## Finally .....

My door is and always has been open – whether you are happy, sad or mad. I need to know if we are not doing something right but I also need to know that you trust our motives and our intentions. Everything we do, every single day is for YOUR children. If we can do it better, tell us. Facebook is for cowards – so please tell us to our face!

Cheryl Rowley went to university after having 3 children. She attended the University of Western Sydney where she took the Aboriginal Rural Education program. Cheryl started teaching at Trangie Central School 14 years ago, where she has stayed throughout her whole teaching life. During her time here she has started teaching the Wiradjuri culture to the Year 7 LOTE class. She has been teaching this for 5 years now.

Cheryl has made a positive impact on teachers, students and community members here at Trangie by sharing her love and knowledge of Aboriginal culture. Students find Ms Rowley approachable, kind and loving.

### **Debbie Skinner**

Debbie, known to many as Aunty Debbie was born in Bourke and raised on the Paroo River among the red dirt as a proud Barkindji woman. She was 1 of 4 girls raised on Wanaaring Station, working the land and is the mother of 6 children - 4 boys and 2 girls, - stepmother to 3 and a grandmother to 14 grandchildren. Aunty Debbie is also the mother of over 300 foster children. With her husband Paki, they have offered a safe haven and home to many children from all backgrounds and circumstances; she has dedicated over 25 years of her life to this passion.

Aunty Debbie completed Year 12 at Red Bend Catholic College and went on to complete a Business Degree in Sydney. She moved to Trangie 30 years ago and has provided support and help to many families locally. Aunty Debbie is on the Expert Advisory Board to Parliament, developing policy and procedures in the Foster Care System, with particular focus on Indigenous children and Carers. She has been acknowledged for her dedication receiving prestigious awards such as the Joy Trudget Memorial Award, which recognises her dedication to children in care and in 2002, Aunty Debbie received the Carer of the Year Award for the state. She volunteers for Connecting Carers, AbSec, and runs training days to support new carers. She provides support for Aboriginal people when dealing with police locally and assists with trauma victims regionally. These are just a few achievements mentioned.

This year's "Because of Her, We Can" NAIDOC theme gives us the opportunity to acknowledge the hard work, love, support and care Aunty Debbie has provided to so many in need. We want to celebrate her for the invaluable contributions she has made and continues to make to better the lives of so many children, communities and families. Her achievements, her voice, her unwavering passion, give us strength and paves the way for a brighter future for generations to come.

## 10 Reasons to Plant a Tree in Your Yard

Trees are a vital part of our world, and crucial to our survival. They provide us with the oxygen we need to breathe, shelter for wildlife, and food to eat. But, there's so much more. Here are 10 reasons why trees are important.

1. Trees increase property values.
2. Trees clean the air. Trees are the lungs of our environment!
3. Trees slow water runoff. Flash flooding can be significantly reduced by planting trees.
4. Trees prevent soil erosion. A tree's root system binds the soil and its leaves provide a barrier to the wind and rain; thus preventing soil erosion.
5. Trees help buffer noise pollution.
6. Trees cool our homes, streets, and cities. Trees can cool a town by 12° C by shading homes and streets, breaking up urban "heat islands", and releasing water vapour into the air through their leaves.
7. Trees can save you money on energy costs. Trees can save on energy bills by providing shade in the summer and windbreaks in the winter.
8. Trees are beautiful. Trees are stunning parts of our natural landscape. From the first buds of spring to the colourful leaves in autumn, trees are gorgeous. They make a great decoration indoors or outdoors.
9. Trees are sacred. Trees were sacred to many ancient worlds, and still hold special meaning in many cultures today.
10. Medicines are derived from trees (and plants). Did you know that aspirin was derived from willow bark? Or that dogwood bark has been used as a substitute for quinine? What about eucalyptus and lemon cough drops?

## Stargazer Alert - Lunar Eclipse in Trangie this weekend!



Stage 4 students are studying the Solar System this semester, and because we have such dedicated science teachers, we have organised for a Lunar Eclipse to occur this weekend!

A lunar eclipse occurs when the Earth moves between the sun and the moon, completely blocking direct sunlight from reaching the moon, which gives the moon an orange/red hue that earns it the moniker of a "blood moon".

If you can get yourselves up early on Saturday, you can start to watch the Blood Moon turn red at about 5.30am. There won't be another one viewable from Australia until 2021. So if you enjoy astronomy, it's definitely worth getting up for.

## \$100 rebate for creative kids

A new \$100 Creative Kids Rebate will allow young people to experience cultural and learning activities outside of school from 2019.



The Creative Kids Rebate can be put towards the cost of registration, participation or tuition fees for creative and cultural activities such as music lessons, language classes, coding and digital, visual and performing arts.

From 1 January 2019, parents will be able to access both the \$100 Active Kids voucher and the \$100 Creative Kids Rebate each year for every school-aged child.

Parents will be able to access the rebate online or in person at a Service NSW centre.

Treasurer Dominic Perrottet said easing the cost-of-living pressures for parents and helping children learn and experience new activities was central to Creative Kids.

"We want to give every encouragement and every opportunity for children to try new things and have the best start in life," Mr Perrottet said.

"For a family with two children, Creative and Active Kids combined will save you \$400 a year."

More information about the rebate, including the eligibility criteria and providers, will be available in the coming months.
