For SES WOW DAY everyone is asked to dress up in orange clothes to celebrate and support. Last week our school had Harmony Day where our school dressed up in Orange and we would like to let our SES volunteers know that this was a double celebration in support. We thank all those selfless people who give their time for others to be safe.

Whole Community Voice

At TCS we have a strong and successful record of making the wellbeing of our students a priority. We believe that if students are happy, feel valued and feel like they belong, then they will learn. We also believe that if anyone, be it community, staff or students feel like their voice is heard then this also leads to a feeling of wellbeing.

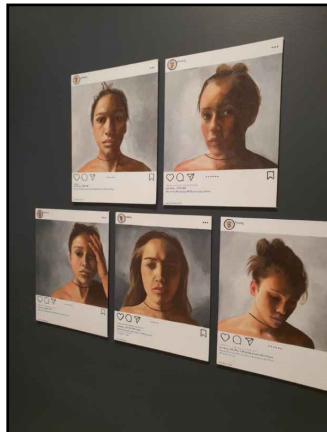

Literacy at TCS

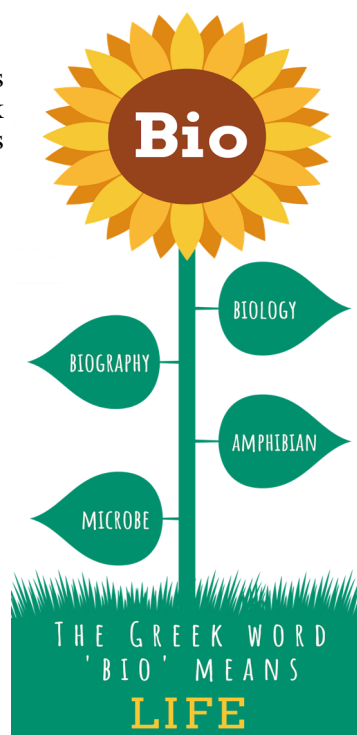
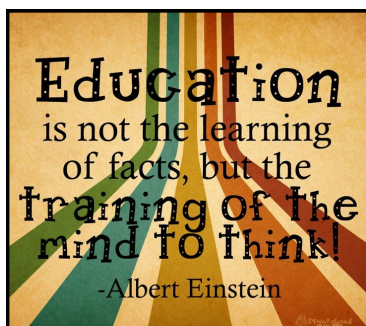
Fortnight Focus

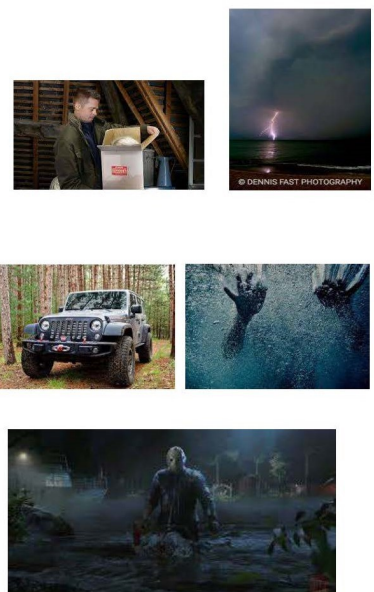

It was getting dark, the ground was trembling and we could see lava spitting out from the humongous volcano. A family of hyenas huddled together and hid away from the spitting fire.

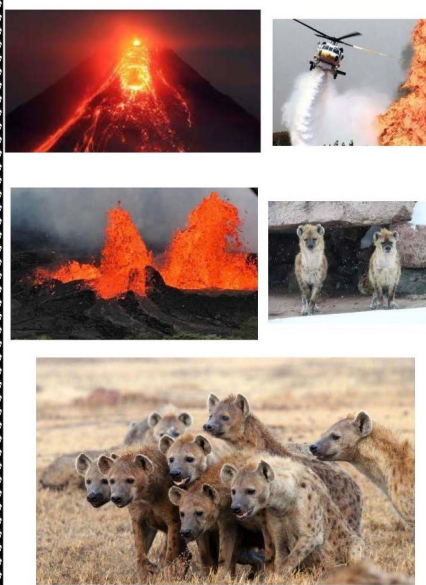
The hyenas were howling to warn all their family of the danger coming and the need to escape the flowing sea of red.

Kids screaming. Mothers howling. Fathers chattering as Jurgens runs wild around the zoo.

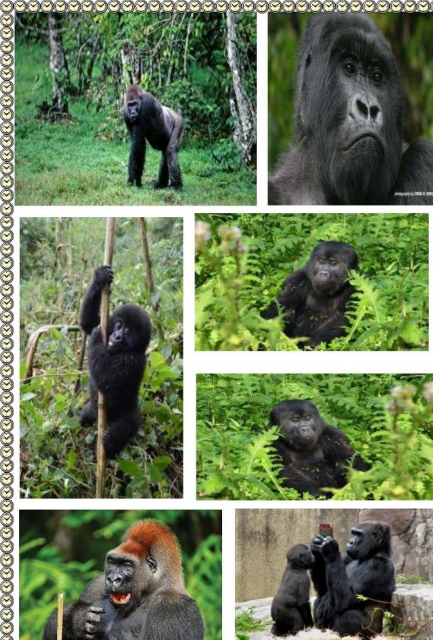
As everyone takes cover the zookeeper needs to think quick. Before his eyes Jurgens is releasing his animal friends. The zoo has now been overtaken.

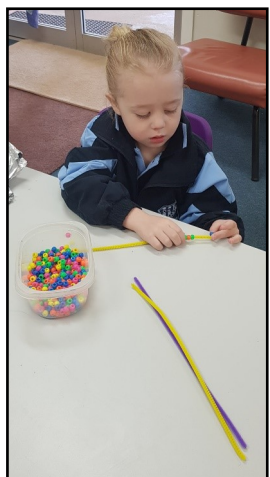
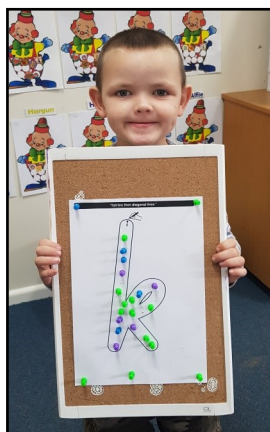
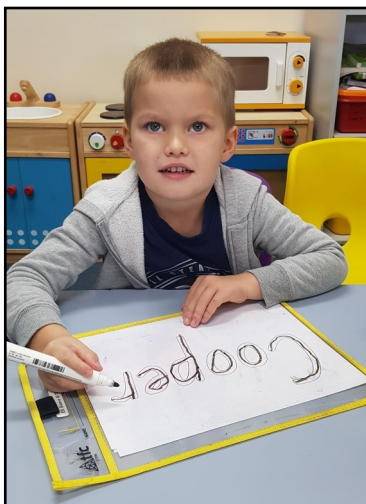

As an Early Action for Success School, Trangie Central uses a targeted approach to improve students' performance in Numeracy and Literacy skills in their early years of schooling.

The Early Action for Success strategy involves:

- Early identification of the level of attainment in literacy and numeracy of each individual child (K-2).
- Differentiating teaching practice that focuses on the needs of the individual student.
- Using targeted interventions in literacy and/or numeracy according to need.
- On-going monitoring of student progress against the Literacy and Numeracy Learning Progressions.

At Trangie Central School we have the expectation that every student in our care will be actively engaged in meaningful, challenging and future-focused learning experiences to achieve and thrive as a learner.

- Early intervention is in place for students at risk.
- The expectations and targets for our students' learning are clearly communicated.
- Staff have a collaborative approach in decision making regarding specific and identified needs of our students.
- We have an Instructional Leader appointed who works alongside K-2 classroom teachers and contributes to school improvement agenda grounded in research and shared best practice.
- Classroom based professional learning is targeted and focuses on new and better ways of delivering public education.
