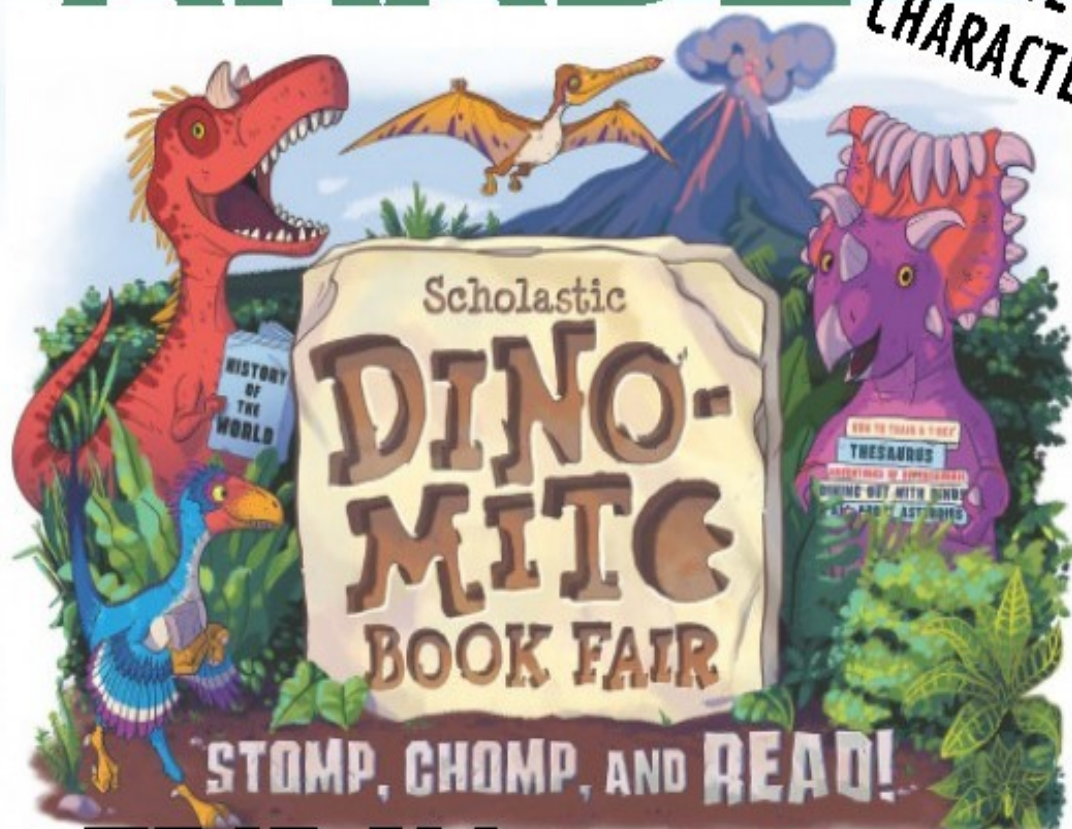

Moorambilla

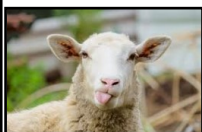

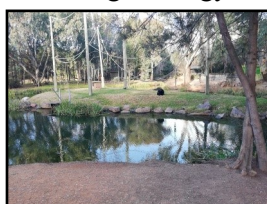

The Game Changer Challenge

Last Thursday, our team of problem-solvers headed off to conquer The Game Changer Challenge at Charles Sturt University in Dubbo. The team comprised of Jay & Kai Greenwood, Annalee Ball, Jae-Lee Edwards, Zephyr Nielsen and David Barclay. Before entering the battle of the brains, our team had to tame the wildlife at Taronga Western Plains Zoo. They enjoyed a night and morning tour, with the outgoing white handed gibbon primate being the highlight. Once the team arrived at CSU, they were encouraged to engage in Design Thinking, a problem-solving methodology that can be used to solve problems in creative and innovative ways. Its process includes building empathy, ideating (creating and evaluating ideas) and prototyping. Our students battled to be the brainiest of the bunch by designing Community Connect, an app to get people connected and active in small country towns. Their valiant effort resulted in an honourable mention and second place. Overall, it was a successful excursion and the skills they learned will enhance their thinking in class and model an innovative problem-solving strategy for their peers.

STEM

Presently during STEM, students are working in 4 rotating groups looking at different aspects of water purification. Last week was the first rotation of these groups;

Group 1 used laptops to research answers to three questions posed to them...

1. What are common water contaminants?
2. What happens to humans if they drink contaminated water?
3. What equipment is already available for people to clean their personal drinking water if, for example, they were on a camping trip in South America?

The students worked in pairs to research the questions. They were asked to present their work on a word document and later to email their findings to the teacher. Each group spoke about their findings.

I was impressed with the collaboration between mixed age group partners and the way the students could speak to the whole group about what they had discovered.

Group 2 looked at safety and risk assessment to ensure everyone knows how to keep themselves and others safe in the science laboratory as well as when using tools during this project. Students were able to use the risk assessment matrix to identify the seriousness of a hazard and come up with strategies to reduce risk.

Group 3 became familiar with the Computer Aided Drafting (CAD) program, Tinkercad. Students will use this program as a tool to print 3D components of their solution to water filtration.

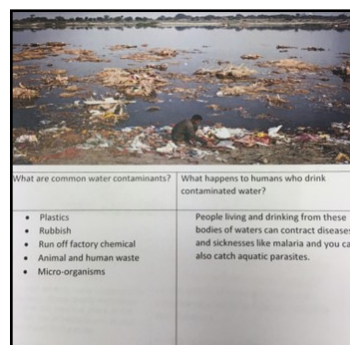
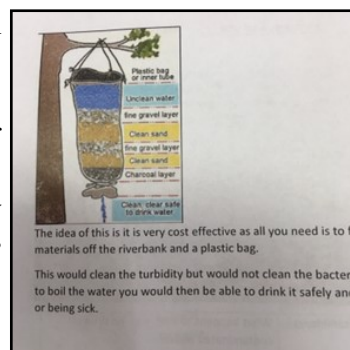
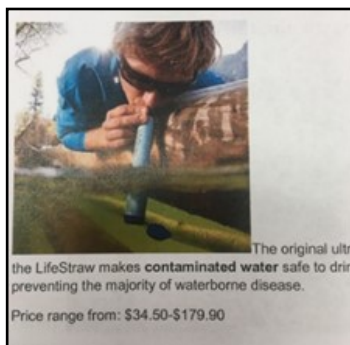

Improve Your Child's Maths in 10 Minutes Per Day!

Are you looking for a quick, fun way to improve your child's maths? Each week this term we will publish instructions for a fun card game that you can play at home with your children.

Place in order – Numeral recognition, numbers before and numbers after a given number

Place all the cards 1(ace) -10 face down in rows of ten so that there are four rows with ten cards in each row.



The aim of the game is to have the cards in order in each row. (cards places 1 - 10). Player 1 turns over the first card and tries to work out where it should be in the row and places the card down. The next player picks up the card where player 1 placed their card and then works out where to put that card. Play continues in this way until all the rows are from 1 - 10.

From sharing pictures of a child's first day at school to key moments at high school, many adults don't consider the potential risks or breach of future privacy for kids. In fact, it is now become a ritual to announce the full name and date of birth of a child online within hours of them being born. This is just the beginning of a child's digital footprint.

Although children are now 'born digital', exposure in the online world can present just as many risks as the physical world can pose. Images and identifying details can be used for numerous activities that put your child at risk, from stalking, to cyberbullying, identity theft, and even digital kidnapping.

The Australian eSafety Commission warns that half of all images on paedophile image-sharing sites originate from social media sites and blogs. Parents are responsible for protecting kids until they are old enough to make their own decisions about their online presence.

So, what can parents do?

Start by 'thinking privacy' before posting images of children online. You'll be protecting their digital footprint and setting them up for a healthy relationship with the digital world.

Seek consent

Always ask others before sharing images of their children, even your family. Speak up about how you feel about images of your child being shared. When your child is old enough, ask them for consent, empowering them to understand they have a right to their privacy online. As they become teenagers, hopefully they will have more respect for what they post online and have confidence to speak to others about their consent guidelines.

Understand the settings

Check the settings of your social media channels to ensure your posts are not public. Speak to your friends and family about this and don't be afraid to ask for help to get it right. If your child has social media channels of their own, go through the settings with them to minimise the risk of unwanted shares.

Think about the detail

Avoid including children's identifiable details such as school badges, logos, uniforms, name tags or identifiable locations such as your home area or school. Alternatively, blur these details prior to posting.

Be selective

Create a simple checklist to help make decisions regarding posting online easy. What do you deem appropriate? Are you happy to share images of your children in swimwear? Do you want to avoid full-frontal face shots?

If your child is old enough, explain why you are selecting certain pictures and not sharing others. If you have a teenager who is sharing their own images, talk to them about what is appropriate and potential repercussions of not setting boundaries.

Remove metadata

Metadata on digital images records the time, date and GPS coordinates of where the photo was taken and can be accessed through shared images, and your sharing service may record your IP address. You can wipe this information with appropriate software or share screenshots of your photos to avoid metadata sharing. Screenshot sharing creates a lower resolution photo, so it's less likely to be tampered with by a third party.

Think 'privacy first' to reduce many of the risks involved with image sharing. Have conversations with your children to instil this mentality; help them build empathy; and identify the steps for minimising risk whilst helping them build a healthy relationship with technology so they can become responsible digital citizens.
