The opportunity to participate in such an activity is invaluable and teaches students a wide range of skills. In our school any student who wishes to be

External Validation

Next term it is our school's turn to be involved in 'External Validation'. This is a process where we have to evaluate our performance against standards set by the School Excellence Framework. We will assess ourselves against this framework and then provide evidence to support this assessment. Our whole staff has been involved in this process, putting in many hours discussing where we are at present, how we can prove this and then what are the next steps in our journey towards excellence. The phone survey of families that we carried out in Term 1 will be conducted again at the beginning of Term 4 and your responses to these surveys will be used to inform our assessment and inform our planning

for the future. We feel it is essential to address any issues raised and also ensure that our school meets the needs of the community. There are other ways to make comment on a regular basis, of course, by way of our twice termly P&C meetings and the Suggestion Box (pictured to the right) one of which is placed on both sides of the school.



Next term we are very sorry to see Mr Troy Jones head for Dubbo for a short spell of leave, until Term 4 next year. Whilst on leave Mr Jones will be working at Skillset Senior College and having a very different teaching experience. Mr Jones has been with us for a long time and I am sure that a change will be as good as a rest. Hopefully he will realise what a wonderful school Trangie Central is and be back very soon. We have advertised an Expression of Interest for Mr Jones' replacement, starting next term for 12 months. If you know of anyone who might like to apply, please let them know that this is a wonderful school to work in with an amazing and dedicated staff.

Year 7 2020 – first Transition day done & dusted

On Wednesday most of our Year 7 class of 2020 joined us on the secondary side for their first taste of high school life. Environmental Education Incursion

"Mrs Bowen visited today from a company called Impact Environmental. She gave us a few different talks about the importance of recycling and what we can do to help our environment. First we did an activity where Mrs Bowen showed us a packaging product and we had to move to the picture of the natural resource it was made of eg oil, trees, metal, sand or bamboo. Then she put us in groups and gave us a product that we had to answer a few questions about; like what on the product was recyclable, was there a better choice than buying the product and what our product



is. After that we looked at something called 'recycle' where you can recycle your soft, squishy plastics. The closest redcycle bin for Trangie is outside Coles in Narromine.

With Mrs Bowen we also talked about climate change, what you can and can't put into green and yellow bins and then we talked about the landfill problems. It is bad for the environment because it produces lots of methane which is one of the greenhouse gasses that makes climate change." — **Cam Broughton, Year 5**



"Today in class, Mrs Bowen visited from Impact Environment. Mrs Bowen taught us about what the point is of packaging. The point of packaging is so if you have a fragile item like eggs you can carry them to where you need to go. Mrs Bowen also taught us a bit about landfill." — **Nate Mayes, Year 5**

"...One of the big, important things that Mrs Bowen taught us was that natural resources are used to make packaging. Most are not renewable. Oil makes plastic and trees make cardboard."—**Austin Ball, Year 5**

"Today in our class, Mrs Bowen visited to tell us about packaging and how to recycle all of our rubbish. If we didn't have packaging all our stuff would break (if it's really delicate) or if you have to buy meat your food could have hair or dirt or even germs on it.

Recycling is a big thing in our country because our landfill is really disgusting because some people are not recycling and some people don't care and just put it in any bin which means our environment is filling up with rubbish." - **Piper Mitchell, Year 5**



"Mrs Bowen visited from Impact Environmental and taught us more about recycling. She told us how we can stop plastic from going into landfill. She said that there are bins outside Coles in Narromine so we can put our soft plastics in there and they won't be buried in landfill but turned into furniture in Victoria. It is called redcycle.



Mrs Bowen also said that we can choose different things in the supermarket like buying a big packet of chips and putting a handful into a container to bring to school instead of buying a box with 20 little packets which create more plastic waste." - **Jock Kater, Year 5**

Improve your child's Maths in 10 minutes per day!

We hope you have enjoyed the series of card games that have been published in the newsletter each week this term. If you have been playing any with your children we would love to hear which were your favourites and if you have noticed an improvement in your son/daughter's maths skills.

Salute - Addition and subtraction

You need:

- a short deck 2 to 10
- 3 players

Deal one card each, face down. When the dealer says "salute", each player raises the card to his or her forehead. The dealer states the total of the cards. Each player has to determine the value of the card being held to his or her forehead by looking at the other person's card and subtracting this amount from the total.

This can also be played with multiplication.

Variation

The dealer looks at the colour of the cards. If the colours are the same the dealer adds and if the colours are different, the dealer multiplies. This time, the player has to state both the colour and the value of the card being held.

He is a crop duster and an aerial fire fighter. He sometimes works in Australia around NSW as a crop duster, but since there is a drought it makes it a lot harder to work, so he goes to America to do it. He is also an aerial fire fighter.

Matt Thomas (Reggie's dad) came to school and told us about his career as a pilot. Matt started to tell us about what it's like flying a plane and putting out fires. Then he told us about what the liquid is that puts out the fires. He also showed us his pilot's licence and told us how to earn one. His first job was as a crop duster, his other job is an aerial fire fighter. He showed us what he wears when he is putting out fires, he also showed us the instruments of a plane. 




